Wheathampstead.net

Nearly 25 years ago, Wheathampstead resident Brian Joyce set out to build a Wheathampstead Community website. In those days there was no "off-the-shelf" website design software; Brian taught himself how to code in HTML and, in the following years, created the website known to many of us as the "*Wheathampstead.net website*".

The site became an invaluable source of information about the local community as Brian built it up to include "What's on" pages, information about local businesses, voluntary groups and the churches, and a major repository of material about the history of Wheathampstead, with particular emphasis on families and people.



By 2017, Brian was finding it increasingly difficult to maintain the site and asked the History Society for help to ensure its continuity. He copied every file onto a CD which we have had in our possession ever since. Brian passed away two years ago and his website went offline in November 2023 when the subscription expired. It was not possible, for technical reasons, simply to transfer Brian's files to our website so we have converted them all into formats that can be uploaded to our website. The uploading will be carried out in the next few months.

Obviously, it is the personal and family history files that are of most interest to the Society but the information about local businesses etc, last updated in 2016 and therefore out of date, is nevertheless an important snapshot of village life at that time and has also been preserved.

Right from the start in 2001, Brian contacted many residents and former residents (whom he called 'Expatriates') asking them for anything they had written about the history of their family or for their memories of life in the village. Responses came from all over the world and make up an important archive for local historians as well as being just a "good read". We have assembled these "Memories" into a folder of that name which will be added to the dropdown menu on our website. We will add the many memories that members of the Society have recorded in recent years (for example in the High Street Project) and which are being added to all the time. We have also acquired 14 recordings of oral history interviews with elderly residents carried out by the late Amy Coburn in 1977.

Most of the other Brian Joyce files are static in nature, ie they cannot or should not be added to or amended. These will also be uploaded to our website in a folder called "Brian Joyce archive" on the dropdown menu.

Every item from Brian's website that will appear on ours has this at the top of the first page.
